Notes from Common Worship: Services and Prayers for the Church of England

From earliest times, Christians gathered at regular hours during each day and night to respond to God's word with praise on behalf of all creation and with intercession for the salvation of the world.

By the fourth century, if not earlier, morning and evening had emerged as the pre-eminent hours for the offering of this sacrifice of praise. They have remained so ever since, especially on Sundays when the Church commemorates both the first day of creation and the day of Christ's resurrection.

This service is intended to help us take our part in this privilege and duty which belongs to all God's priestly people.

The order of service is very flexible and service leaders should exercise freedom within its framework. The core, however, consists of the Liturgy of the Word interwoven with praise, followed by intercessory prayer.

Whenever possible, the service should include some singing for the work of God in Christ.

Preparation

A minister may use an invitation to confession

May the God of love and power forgive *us* and free *us* from *our* sins, heal and strengthen *us* by his Spirit, and raise *us* to new life in Christ our Lord. *All* **Amen.** O Lord, open our lips *All* and our mouth shall proclaim your praise.

In your resurrection, O Christ, *All* **let heaven and earth rejoice. Alleluia.**

Blessed are you, Lord God of our salvation,
to you be praise and glory for ever.


